

Homelessness is a serious problem in all major cities, particularly port cities and Sydney is no exception. According to some reports high



But there is one small silver lining. A charity entitled Paws For A Purpose, is determined to aid in providing veterinary assistance to homeless pet parent's animals across Australia running a free veterinary clinic in parks. What a wonderful humanitarian gesture.
